LUKE 24:15-52

1. WHAT IS THE BIBLE?

- "Bible" = "books"
- 39 OT, 27 NT
- Many different genres
- Dates: Moses in about 1500BC to Apostles in 1st century AD

2. WHAT IS THE BIBLE'S MESSAGE?

• = "the gracious and sovereign plan of God, to glorify Himself, by reversing the effects of sin and establishing the unchallenged rule of His Son."

 Mark 1:14-15, "After John was put in prison, Jesus went into Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God. ¹⁵ "The time has come," he said.
"The kingdom of God is near. Repent and believe the good news!"

3. WHAT ARE THE MAIN DIVISIONS IN THE BIBLE?

(a) Old Testament and New Testament

• Luke 24:15-52

The OT looks forward

Expecting God to act in the future... as he has in the past... but in a new way

Looking for a person... a place... a people... a time

Time: Day of the Lord

eg. Amos 5:18-20

Person: Messiah / Son of David

Son of David eg. 2 Sam 7, Isa 9:7

God's future and eternal king, eg. Ps 2, Psalm 16 Servant of Yahweh, Isa 42,49,50,53 (servant songs)

Son of Man, Dan 7 Shepherd, Ezek 34

Eternal priest, Ps 110 (Melchizedekian priest) Another prophet like Moses, Deut 18:15ff

Place: Materialistic hope

Return of paradise, Is 11:6-9, 15:8, Amos 9:18 Renewed holy land (Isa 62:4, Jer 30:3, Amos 9:13

Renewed holy city (Isa 60-66, Ezek 40-48)

People: Spiritual renewal

Restoration after j'ment, Jer 29:14, 30:3

Return of a remnant after exile, Is 7:3, Jer 23:3, Mic 2:12

New exodus, Zech 10:8-11 New covenant, Jer 30-33

God will give a new spirit, Ezek 11:19, 36:26, Hos 6:1-3.

(b) How does the Old Testament divide up?

- The story of the OT
 - o OT written in Hebrew (and Aramaic) between 1500-400BC
 - OT translated into Greek (Septuagint , LXX) in 200BC
- Our English Bibles follow the <u>Greek LXX ordering of the OT</u>:

Historical books	Mixed poetry	Prophetic books
Genesis to Esther	Job to Song of Songs	Isaiah to Malachi

• The <u>Hebrew</u> Bible has a different order: <u>law, prophets and writings</u> (e.g. Luke 24:44, Romans 3:21, Acts 28:23):
