DEFENDING OUR HOPE: APOLOGETICS AND EVANGELISM (2)

DISCUSS WHILE WAITING TO BEGIN:

Look at the seven questions below. As a Christian how would you answer each one? If time permits consider how a specific non-believing friend would answer them.

1. THERE ARE TWO WAYS TO LIVE (OR TWO "WORLDVIEWS")

What is a worldview?

James Sire: "A worldview is a set of presuppositions (assumptions which may be true, partially true or entirely false) which we hold (consciously or subconsciously, consistently or inconsistently) about the basic makeup of our world... They are generally unquestioned by each of us, rarely, if ever, mentioned by our friends, and only brought to mind when we are challenged by a foreigner from another ideological universe." (*The universe next door: a basic worldview catalog,* pp16,17)

- 1. What is REAL? (e.g. God / gods / the stuff that the universe is made of)
- What is the world around us LIKE? (e.g. created / chaotic / orderly / separate from us / connected to us)
- 3. What is a HUMAN BEING? (e.g. a machine / a god / a naked ape / a person in God's image)
- What happens to a person AT DEATH? (e.g. extinction / reincarnation / etc)
- How can we KNOW anything at all? (e.g. our minds have evolved / made in God's image, etc)
- 6. How do we know what's RIGHT & WRONG? (e.g. from God / choice / etc)
- What is the meaning of HUMAN HISTORY? (e.g. achieve the purpose of God or of gods / no purpose / etc)

Apologetics = attacking non-belief and commending faith in Jesus

The two great questions

- Is it true? (Is it intellectually credible?)
- Is it good? (Truly good... in your personal experience. Is it existentially satisfying).

2. ATTACKING UNBELIEF

(i)

- Unbelief = living life with the assumption that Jesus is NOT Lord
- . Is it OK to attack anything?

Peter 3:16, gentleness and respect

Necessary negatives, e.g. John 14:6

It's implausible

2 Corinthians 10:4-6

• Attacking unbelief – show that it is UNTRUE and it is NOT GOOD

(.,	it s implausible	e.g. vvvy do you believe that.
(ii)	It's inconsistent and wrong?	e.g. Didn't you just say there's no right
(iii)	It's impractical like that?	e.g. Do you really want to live in a world

e.g. Why do you believe that?

3. PROCLAIMING BELIEF IN JESUS

- Defending Christ against detractors...
- AND declaring Christ as Lord, from the Scriptures

Answer questions directly from the Bible – and use our society's respect for Jesus as a good teacher. E.g.

I'm a good person, why do I need Jesus? (Mark 10:13-27, 12:28-31, John 3:1-16)

Do you think there's truth in all the religions of the world? (Mark 2:1-12, John 14:5-10)

I'm a cynic by nature – I won't believe without proof. (John 20:24-31)

I'm just not the religious type (Mark 2:13-17, Luke 19:1-10)
