FOLLOWING JESUS - IN OUR RELATIONSHIPS

Discuss with a neighbour: How does the world define love? How does the Bible define love?

Introduction:

- Today: love, sex, relationships from God as He has revealed in His Word, the Bible
- A topic where we are <u>all</u> failures in need of our saviour Jesus!

1. Love that looks upwards

- God teaches us what love is: He is Love, He is a Covenant God, He gave His Son.
- God's definition of love is "covenant": a rock-solid commitment to bind Himself to unfaithful people, redeem and sanctify them. Contrast with world's definition of love!
- God's design for brotherly/sisterly love: *strive* to love each other, more & more
- God's design for romantic love:
 - For it to reflect God's love for us a picture of the gospel (Ephesians 5:22-23)
 - Sex is a good gift from God to be enjoyed within the lifelong commitment between one man and one woman (i.e. in marriage)
 - All other expressions of sex are wrong flee these most urgently

Discuss in small groups: "I wish I knew God's will for my life" – how does 1 Thessalonians 4: 3-7 answer this? Are we surprised where Paul goes with the answer?

2. Love that looks forward

- What is Jesus' ultimate aim for us? For us to mature as Christians, grow in holiness, be effective in ministry and persevere to the end
- Implication for love, sex & relationships:
 - Don't idolise or idealise marriage (whether married or not)
 - o If you marry, marry a Christian
 - The vital importance of killing off sexual sin

3. Love that looks outward

• Modelled on Jesus, love that focusses on serving the other person, not self (not easy!)

Tips:

- \circ The better your relationship is with the Lord, the better a spouse you will be
- Communication: listen to your spouse and talk to them (not about them)
- Will you lay down your life (or at least your preferences) for your spouse?
- Be quick to forgive / admit be proactive (Eph. 4:26)
- o ... within a backdrop where separation is not an option

Discussion / Questions

- 1. In the New Testament letters, sexual (im)purity is at the start (or near the start) of almost every list of sins to avoid why is it such a big deal?
- 2. Jesus has designed Church as a family made up of all kinds of people (married, single, young, old etc.) What do you think you could do to foster unity & inclusion?
- 3. In 1 Corinthians, they seemed to be using Christian "slogans" to justify impure sexual behaviour ("all things are lawful to me" 1 Cor 6:12). We observe the same approach today (e.g. "love is love" to justify same-sex marriage). How can a Christian respond?
