Intro: Why bother with the Psalms?

Psalm 6

To the choirmaster: with stringed instruments; according to The Sheminith.^a A Psalm of David.

- ¹ O LORD, rebuke me not in your anger,
nor discipline me in your wrath.
- ² Be gracious to me, O LORD, for I am languishing;
heal me, O LORD, for my bones are troubled.
- ³ My soul also is greatly troubled.
But you, O LORD—how long?
- ⁴ Turn, O LORD, deliver my life;
save me for the sake of your steadfast love.
- ⁵ For in death there is no remembrance of you;
in Sheol who will give you praise?
- ⁶ I am weary with my moaning;
every night I flood my bed with tears;
I drench my couch with my weeping.
- ⁷ My eye wastes away because of grief;
it grows weak because of all my foes.
- ⁸ Depart from me, all you workers of evil,
for the LORD has heard the sound of my weeping.
- ⁹ The LORD has heard my plea;
the LORD accepts my prayer.
- ¹⁰ All my enemies shall be ashamed and greatly troubled;
they shall turn back and be put to shame in a moment.

Footnotes

a. Probably a musical or liturgical term

Why Psalms? Ephesians 5:19 and Colossians 3:16 (psalms and hymns and spiritual songs)

John 12:27 “My soul is greatly troubled” echoes Psalm 6:3 “My soul also is greatly troubled” and other psalms.

Matthew 7:23 “depart from me, you workers of lawlessness” and Luke 13:27 “Depart from me, all you workers of evil” echo Psalm 6:8 “Depart from me, all you workers of evil.”

How can we encourage one another to learn real sorrow and tears for our sins?

Psalm 84

To the choirmaster: according to The Gittith.^[a] A Psalm of the Sons of Korah.

¹ How lovely is your dwelling place,
O LORD of hosts!

² My soul longs, yes, faints
for the courts of the LORD;
my heart and flesh sing for joy
to the living God.

³ Even the sparrow finds a home,
and the swallow a nest for herself,
where she may lay her young,
at your altars, O LORD of hosts,
my King and my God.

⁴ Blessed are those who dwell in your house,
ever singing your praise! *Selah*

⁵ Blessed are those whose strength is in you,
in whose heart are the highways to Zion.^[b]

⁶ As they go through the Valley of Baca
they make it a place of springs;
the early rain also covers it with pools.

⁷ They go from strength to strength;
each one appears before God in Zion.

⁸ O LORD God of hosts, hear my prayer;
give ear, O God of Jacob! *Selah*

⁹ Behold our shield, O God;
look on the face of your anointed!

¹⁰ For a day in your courts is better
than a thousand elsewhere.

I would rather be a doorkeeper in the house of my God
than dwell in the tents of wickedness.

¹¹ For the LORD God is a sun and shield;
the LORD bestows favour and honour.

No good thing does he withhold
from those who walk uprightly.

¹² O LORD of hosts,
blessed is the one who trusts in you!

Can you think of any ways in which your own failures match up with how the people of Israel failed? How does the patience of God encourage you when face to face with your failures?

Psalm 149

¹ Praise the LORD!
Sing to the LORD a new song,
his praise in the assembly of the godly!
² Let Israel be glad in his Maker;
let the children of Zion rejoice in their King!
³ Let them praise his name with dancing,
making melody to him with tambourine and lyre!
⁴ For the LORD takes pleasure in his people;
he adorns the humble with salvation.
⁵ Let the godly exult in glory;
let them sing for joy on their beds.
⁶ Let the high praises of God be in their throats
and two-edged swords in their hands,
⁷ to execute vengeance on the nations
and punishments on the peoples,
⁸ to bind their kings with chains
and their nobles with fetters of iron,
⁹ to execute on them the judgement written!
This is honour for all his godly ones.
Praise the LORD!
